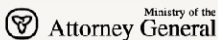

Superior North Victim Services is governed by a Volunteer Community Board of Directors

Incorporated as a non-profit charitable organization

Service area encompasses Marathon, Manitouwadge and Pic River First Nations

Superior North Victim Services are available free of charge to individuals 16 years of age and older with the affected person's consent

Protocols are established with other service agencies to ensure coordinated effort to aid victims of crime, tragedy and disaster

How We Can Assist?

Our trained volunteers:

- Respond quickly to a call to help lessen the trauma of being victimized
- Help the victim cope with the impact of a crisis situation
- Provide emotional support and practical assistance to victims and their families
- Encourage victims to connect with the appropriate services in their communities
- Identify options and choices to victims
- Assist police and other emergency personnel to allow them to complete their job
- Provide opportunities for the residents of Marathon, Manitouwadge and Pic River First Nations to become actively involved with helping others in their community

Who is a Victim?

A victim is any person whose life has been affected by the action of a crime, tragedy or disaster.

Victims include the primary victim, the victim's family, friends, co-workers, other significant persons to the victim, witnesses and bystanders to an event.

Crisis

Reactions to a crisis can vary from person to person. It is normal and natural for a victim to feel sad, angry, and vulnerable. Experiencing a variety of emotions is a normal reaction to an abnormal experience.

Trained staff and volunteers are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, to provide much needed emotional support, practical assistance and referral information.
